Dialogue

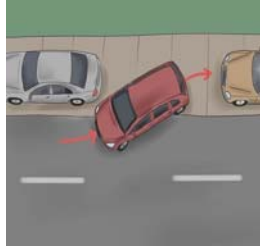
- A: Okay Mr. Smith, let's begin your road test. You can start your car now.
